GEORGE C. FIDAS is an analyst with the U.S. government. His Master's thesis at the University of Rhode Island dealt with the Communist movement in Cyprus, and his doctoral dissertation at the University of Maryland attempts to apply classical organization theory to the evolution of non-ruling Communist parties. He is at present writing a comparative study of the Communist movements of Greece and Cyprus, where he has done extensive field research.

MICHAEL H. FLEET is Assistant Professor of Political Science and International Relations at the University of Southern California. His interests lie in the area of Latin American politics and political theory, including Marxism. He has lived and traveled widely in Latin America, and in 1968–1969 was Visiting Professor, Escuela de Ciencias Politicas y Administrativas, Universidad de Chile. He has also taught at Merrill College, University of California, Santa Cruz, and at Gonzaga University. Professor Fleet is the author of several recent articles on the Allende government in Chile, and a contributor to Luigi R. Einaudi' (ed.), Beyond Cuba: Latin America Faces the Seventies (1973).

THOMAS H. GREENE is Associate Professor of Political Science at the University of Southern California. He has published on non-ruling Communist parties in World Politics, Rassegna Italiana di Sociologia, and Studies in Comparative Communism. He is the author of Comparative Revolutionary Movements (forthcoming) and coauthor of the third edition of Introduction to Political Science (forthcoming).

JOHN H. HODGSON is Professor of Political Science and department chairman at Syracuse University. He has done field work in Finland on grants from the Fulbright Program (1955-1956), the Ford Foundation (1960-1962), Harvard University's Russian Research Center (1963), and the American Council of Learned Societies (1969-1970). He is the author of Communism in Finland: A History and Interpretation (1967) and Edvard Gylling ja Otto W. Kuusinen asiakirjojen valossa, 1918-1920 (Helsinki, forthcoming). He has also written a political biography of Kuusinen which will soon be published in Swedish, and he was the translator for Jaakko Nousiainen. The Finnish Political System (1971). Articles by Professor Hodgson on Soviet foreign policy and Finnish politics have appeared in the Slavic Review, Government and Opposition, the Western Political Quarterly, and Problems of Communism.

MARGARET KRAHENBUHL is a research associate in the Social Science Department, The Rand Corporation, specializing in Middle Eastern affairs. In 1967–1968 she was a Fulbright Fellow in Turkey. She is currently finishing her doctoral dissertation in political science at the University of California at Los Angeles on politics and leftist ideology in Turkey in the 1930s.

J. A. A. STOCKWIN is a Reader in the Department of Political Science, Australian National University. He has made numerous field trips to Japan, including an extended period of study at the University of Tokyo. In 1967 he was Visiting Fellow at the University of Sussex, and in 1973 Senior Associate Member, St. Antony's College, Oxford. Dr. Stockwin is the editor of Japan and Australia in the Seventies (1972), and the author of The Japanese Socialist Party and Neutralism (1968) and Japan: Divided Politics in a Growth Economy (forthcoming).

RUDOLF L. TÖKÉS is Associate Professor of Political Science at the University of Connecticut and Associate Editor of Studies in Comparative Communism. A former Senior Fellow of the Research Institute on Communist Affairs, Columbia University, he has also taught at Wesleyan and Yale. He is the author of Bela Kun and the Hungarian Soviet Republic (1967), The Communist Party and the Hungarian Left, 1920-1944 (in preparation), and articles in such journals as American Political Science Review, East Europe, East European Quarterly, Problems of Communism, and Slavic Review; a contributor to Ivan Volgyes (ed.), Hungary in Revolution, 1918-1919: Nine Essays; and the editor of and a contributor to the forthcoming The Politics and Ideologies of Dissent in the USSR and Soviet Society and Politics in the 1970s (with Henry W. JOAN BARTH URBAN is Associate Professor of Politics at the Catholic University of America. A former staff member of the M.I.T. Center for International Studies and a recipient of two fellowships for research in Italy, she is currently completing a book-length study of the Italian Communist Party in historical and international perspective—an outgrowth of her dissertation at Harvard University under the late Merle Fainsod.
