## IN THIS ISSUE

The account of the first session of the United Nations Organization is given by *Irving De Witt Talmadge* of New York City. Mr. Talmadge has traveled extensively through Europe where he worked on English-language newspapers and for American press associations. Besides contributing articles on international relations to many current periodicals, he has also edited a book, *Whose Revolution?*

Professor of Latin American History at the University of Pennsylvania and editor of the annual survey, *Inter-American Affairs*, *Arthur P. Whitaker* plans to teach in Bogota, Colombia, during the summer of 1946. In 1943-44 he was an officer of the State Department working on Latin American affairs. Mr. Whitaker has traveled and studied in Latin America and has written several books.

From 1943-45, *Leo Gershey* was on leave from Sarah Lawrence College for war work in Washington. At first with the Foreign Broadcast Intelligence Service, the second year of Mr. Gershey's war work was devoted to the overseas branch of the OWI where he was in charge of policy questions for France.

*Maxine Mathews* made her study of Pakistan under the direction of T. Walter Wallbank in the Graduate School of the University of Southern California. Now Miss Mathews is teaching at the East Tennessee State College, where, in addition, she is working on a project for the State Historical Society.
