If GERMAN FOREIGN POLICY is the key to European stability, FRENCH FOREIGN POLICY is surely a prime factor in determining the policy of the West German Republic. In May, eight articles will consider the historic and contemporary effects of French foreign policy on Europe and the rest of the world. Contributing to this important study will be:

Ellen D. Ellis, Professor Emeritus of Political Science at Mount Holyoke College, writing on the French parliamentary system;

Alzada M. Comstock, Professor Emeritus of Economics at Mount Holyoke College, outlining France's economic and financial status;

Marshall Dill, Jr., Assistant Professor of History at the University of Pennsylvania, analyzing France's search for security against Germany;

Constance Smith, Instructor in History and Government at Wheaton College, writing on French policy toward the Saar;

Thomas E. Ennis, Professor of Modern European and Asian History at West Virginia University, exploring French-Indo-Chinese relations;

Alvin Z. Rubinstein, Ph.D. from the University of Pennsylvania, evaluating France's approach to problems in North Africa;

Frederick L. Schuman, Woodrow Wilson Professor of Government at Williams College, analyzing past and present French policy toward Russia;

Ross N. Berkes, Director, School of International Relations, University of Southern California, examining France's relations with nations of the North Atlantic Community.

Daniel G. Redmond, Editor and Publisher of CURRENT HISTORY since 1943, died on February 21, 1955. He will be missed by the CURRENT HISTORY staff, by all our contributors and by our readers as well.
