POLITICAL THOUGHT IN PERSPECTIVE

By **WILLIAM EBENSTEIN**, Princeton University. Ready in May.

A text offering a fresh, original approach to teaching the history of political thought. It is the first and only book to present the development of political thought since Plato in the words of the great writers themselves. Such great statesmen as Frederick the Great, Woodrow Wilson, Nehru and Churchill are included among the authors—a total of 26 leading figures from Plato to Lenin. The result is a greater liveliness of presentation, with the authors writing about men, rather than about abstract ideas.

ALEXANDER HAMILTON: In The American Tradition

By **LOUIS M. HACKER**, Columbia University. 288 pages, \$4.75.

The first full-length reappraisal of the man who, more than any other, personified the conservative tradition in America and who, during the 1957 Alexander Hamilton Bicentennial Celebration, promises to once again become a controversial figure. This illuminating study is concerned with the story of the crises and the policies which emerged from them during his time. From Hamilton's conviction that a nation, in order to survive, must have integrity, to his feeling that government must be in the hands of the capable, here is an analysis in the light of both their historical origin and of 20th century America.

AMERICAN CIVILIZATION: A HISTORY OF THE UNITED STATES

By **WESLEY M. GEWEHR**; **DONALD C. GORDON**; **DAVID S. SPARKS**; and **ROLAND N. STROMBERG**, all at University of Maryland. *McGraw-Hill Series in History*. Ready in May.

This one-volume survey of United States history points up the significant trends, meanings and interpretations of the nation's experience. Each topic is adequately treated, but factual detail is minimized. The organization is essentially chronological. Chapters and sections on intellectual and social movements are included.

FUNDAMENTALS OF AMERICAN NATIONAL GOVERNMENT

By **CULLEN B. GOSNELL**, Emory University; **LANE W. LANCASTER**, University of Nebraska; and **ROBERT S. RANKIN**, Duke University. *McGraw-Hill Series in Political Science*. 478 pages, \$5.00.

This outstanding text sets forth the principal ideas and ideals underlying American political institutions . . . the machinery of the national government with illustrations of its operation as a going concern . . . and brief treatments, combining both principles and facts of the important functions performed by the national government.
